

Mackie studio monitors are popular models for pro and semi-pro studios alike. Can a second incarnation further their appeal? **Jono Buchanan** casts an ear...

Vocals are a joy to work with as the monitors don't over-colour the upper mids. But the biggest change comes at the bottom. The redesign delivers clearer bass both at high and low listening volumes and it pleased me to note that accurate mixing work with these speakers at lower volume is a more viable proposition than with their forebears. The other improvement borne of the redesign, is that the monitor's sweet spot seems a good deal wider. Of course, any off-axis listening will produce a biased result but such bias seems significantly less with the 624 mk2s than with the original model.

Improvements are subtle but they're welcome nevertheless with reduced top-end brightness, a wider sweet spot and smoother bass extension the principal improvements for me. The price (half that of the original 624s at the time of their release) brings this monitor within reach of semi-pro and serious project studios alike and I'd have no hesitation in recommending this monitor to anyone who takes mixing seriously. **FM**

The most pleasing thing for existing HR624 users considering an upgrade is that the sound of the mk2s isn't radically different. The sound remains transparent and 'unflashy' – there's no attempt to sweeten upper mids to produce a warm, furry sound that fails to cut it when compared to other



subtle and considered updates equals a winning package.
